- 一、國立臺灣師範大學(以下簡稱本校)國文學系五七級畢業生故洪陳慧美女士 其夫婿美國北達科他大學校友洪章夫博士(以下簡稱美方)為紀念洪陳女士, 於美國北達科他大學基金會設立「洪陳慧美紀念獎學金」(以下簡稱本獎學 金),以資助獲有本校碩士學位且未曾獲得博士學位、具潛力之校友赴美國 北達科他大學教育與人類發展學院(College of Education and Human Development, University of North Dakota)以全職學生身份攻讀博士學位,本 校為推薦具潛力之優秀候選人,特訂定本要點。
- 二、凡符合本校當期公告資格者得申請參與甄選。甄選作業時程、應備文件、可 攻讀之系所、審議標準及提予美方之候選人名額等細節,悉依當期公告辦理。
- 三、本校參與甄選者於公告申請期限內檢具申請文件送至國際事務處,由國際 事務處延請國際學術合作委員會(以下簡稱國合會)議決候選人名單,經校 長同意後送美方決選,通過決選者由美方發與入學許可函。
- 四、本獎學金每期獎助1名,每期程最長4年,美國北達科他大學提供免學費、 免保險費與部分津貼之待遇,而美國北達科他大學基金會得視情形另提供 獎學金。前一期程結束後始進行次一期程候選人之甄選。
- 五、受獎人須自行申請赴美簽證及安排在美生活事項(含住宿)。
- 六、受獎人有以下情形者喪失受獎資格,已領取之獎學金全數繳還:
 - (一)未定期繳交美國北達科他大學研修期間之成績單及註冊證明至本校國際事務處。
 - (二) 赴國外期間喪失美國北達科他大學學籍。
 - (三)未經本校及美國北達科他大學同意,任意變更攻讀領域。如提出具體說明者,得申請變更一次,經核定後不得再變更。
 - (四) 取得本獎學金獎助攻讀之學位後,未返臺任職達等同於受獎助之年限。

七、本要點未盡事宜,悉依相關辦法或公告辦理。

八、本要點經本校國際事務處提經國合會會議通過、簽奉校長核定後實施,修正 時亦同。

- 2.由本校轉送捐款人進行審查後,送UND進行決選,預計於次年3月下旬公布結果。



Amy Hung had a wonderful gift and passion for teaching. When her family life brought her to the United States, she began a new journey as she raised her family. Amy's legacy of teaching will never be forgotten as it is passed on through The Amy Hui-Mei Chen Hung Memorial Scholarship Endowment.

American Life

Amy and Akey Hung were married in Taiwan in July 1969. Amy was happily pursuing her research in Chinese etymology and enjoying a very promising teaching career at National Taiwan Normal University when she decided to forego these golden opportunities and come to the United States to join Akey in 1970. Life was not easy for this young couple in a foreign country. Amy had to work to help support the family. In addition to being a full-time mother, she worked as a waitress, dining hall assistant, bookkeeper, student nurse, water treatment plant technician, and Chinese school teacher. She even studied to be a computer programmer.

Amy's 13 years in the United States were earmarked by great self-sacrifice in supporting her husband and raising their two children. Amy passed away in June of 1983 at the age of 39.

New Opportunities

It was always Akey's hope that someday Amy would have the opportunity to resume her research in Chinese etymology and teach at her alma mater in Taiwan. Since this is no longer possible, Akey believes his hope can still be fulfilled in another fashion by offering students and junior faculty members from Amy's alma mater with the opportunity to attend the University of North Dakota and pursue study at the graduate level. The recipients will go back to Taiwan to teach after completing a doctoral degree.

In honor and rememberence of Amy, Akey is expressing his appreciation and gratitude to the University of North Dakota for the educational opportunities afforded him. This opportunity is also in recognition of the excellent education Amy received at National Taiwan Normal University.
